AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

CAPITAL PROJECTS BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes, and projects designated by the appropriations, and authorized to be made available as hereinafter provided to the respective public officers; such appropriations shall be deemed to provide all costs necessary and pertinent to accomplish the intent of the appropriations and are appropriated in accordance with the provisions of section 93 of the state finance law.

11 b) Any amounts specified in this chapter for advances for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes and projects designated by the appropriations as advances from the capital projects fund in accordance with the provisions of sections 40-a and 93 of the state finance law, and are authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided as an advance for a share, part or whole of the cost for such programs, purposes and projects hereinafter specified.

20 c) The several amounts specified in this chapter as capital projects - reappropriations, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, as appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes, and projects, being the undisbursed and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are reappropriated and unless otherwise amended or repealed in part or total in this chapter shall continue to be available for the same purposes as the prior appropriations or as otherwise amended for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2020.

30 The capital projects reappropriations contained in this chapter may be amended by repealing the items set forth in brackets and by adding thereto the underscored material. Certain reappropriations in this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a change is clear-

1 ly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and underscores
2 for additions, the purpose, amounts, funding source and all other
3 aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last appro-
4 priated.

5 For the purpose of complying with section 25 of the state finance law,
6 the year, chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former
7 original appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indi-
8 cated, chapter 54, section 1, of the laws of 2019.

9 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
10 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
11 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
12 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
13 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

14 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
15 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
16 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
17 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
18 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds
19 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
20 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
21 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
22 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
23 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
24 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
25 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
26 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
27 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
28 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior
29 overpayments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back
30 for expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made
31 available to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by
32 the intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not
33 acceptable and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller
34 receives any such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
35 and/or disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated,
36 reimbursed, credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original
37 appropriation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is
38 received regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

39 f) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
40 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2020 except as otherwise noted.
