Brief Description/History/Background:

TThe Uniform Force has primary responsibility for protection of life and property, and all phases of highway safety. For residents of most rural and many suburban areas of New York State, the uniformed Trooper on patrol is the primary provider of police protection.

### Issues:

Over the years, the policing of communities outside New York's cities has evolved in a manner that has fundamentally integrated State Police services and resources with those of local departments. This process is ongoing with the State Police continually reassessing and evaluating the services it provides to ensure all area residents receive full service and coverage with minimal duplication of services. However, even with 4,900 sworn members, the Division of State Police is not in a position to permanently replace local resources when local governments reduce or eliminate police services at the local level. Members of the Uniformed force provide the "surge" capacity which is critical to the initial success of Operation IMPACT initiatives.

### Performance Measures:

Disaster Preparedness The State Police continues to participate in multi agency preparedness exercises including: Operation Urgent Action II held in Syracuse, New York, on May 14, 2008; Federal Radiological Management and Assessment Center Exercise (Empire '09) held April 30 and May 1, 2008, in Troy; "Border Cross" a joint NY/Quebec law enforcement information sharing exercise slated for November 2008; and , "Empire Express 2008" a SEMO-lead hurricane exercise involving state agencies.

Work Zone Safety The State Police works diligently enforcing the vehicle and traffic law in construction work zones. In 2007 a total of 23,605 tickets were issued in work zones statewide, the vast majority of which were for dangerous moving violations, including 14,691 for speeding. A key measure of work zone safety is the number of intrusions, incidents where a motor vehicle enters a portion of the roadway that is closed for construction or maintenance that occur. In 2007, there were 23 intrusions into road construction work zones, compared with 46 intrusions in 2006; a 50 percent reduction. The below chart summarizes the enforcement activity of state police personnel to safeguard these workers during the period April through June, 2008.

Program: Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit

### Mandate:

While all Uniform Force members work to ensure the safe operation of commercial vehicles on New York's roads, the swommembers assigned to the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit (CVEU) are specifically charged with enforcing the Vehicle & Traffic, Transportation and Tax laws pertaining to commercial vehicles.

### Mandated Funding Level:

None

Brief Description/History/Background:

CVEU currently consists of over 100 troopers and sergeants cross-trained in vehicle dimensions, motor carrier inspection and hazardous materials enforcement. They work in conjunction with the state Department of Transportation (NYSDOT), inspecting trucks for safety violations. Since the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, CVEU members have played a key role in the war on terror and drugs, and have been utilized frequently at the state's international border crossings. Given the potential of commercial vehicles for transporting hazardous materials or contraband, investigating them is an important part of ensuring homeland security

### Population Served:

### Performance Measures:

In 2007, CVEU troopers conducted 66,902 commercial vehicle inspections, which uncovered 118,139 violations and resulted in 22,612 vehicles being placed out of service for serious safety violations. In addition, they weighed a total of 100,730 commercial vehicles, an average of 8,644 per month, greatly exceeding their target of 5,000 vehicles monthly. These weight inspections uncovered 17,412 weight violations.

Program: Criminal Investigation Activities - Bureau of Criminal Investigation

### Mandate:

The Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) conducts felony and serious misdemeanor-grade criminal investigations, and provides sophisticated investigative support services to other state, local and federal law enforcement agencies.

### Mandated Funding Level:

None

Brief Description/History/Background:

The Bureau of Criminal Investigation is the non-uniformed investigative branch of the New York State Police, which is primarily responsible for cases requiring extensive investigation or involving felonies. In addition to conducting investigations initiated by the State Police, BCI Investigators regularly assist county and municipal law enforcement agencies that lack the personnel, expertise or material needed for major crime investigations. Specialists within the BCI deal with cases related to narcotics, violent and serial crimes, child abuse and sexual exploitation, computer and technology-related crimes, blas-related crimes, auto theft, illegal gun trafficking, consumer product tampering and organized crime.

### Issues:

In addition to "backroom" Investigators assigned to stations across the State, members assigned to specialized units such as CNET, VFW, VCIT and GIU are key components of the package of resources available to Operation IMPACT jurisdictions.

Selected Specialized Details: During 2007, VFW personnel investigated 1,931 cases, closing 1,915 by arrest. These included arrests for 32 murderers, 78 sex offenders, 82 robberles arrests, 169 narco-criminals, 61 felony assaults, 16 firearms cases, eight arsons, 41 burglars, 10 escape/absconders/ball jumpers, 148 federal statue violators, 147 fugitive from justice arrests, 321 parole and 389 probation violators. GIU personnel seized 451 weapons in 2007, purchased 84 weapons, arrested 641 persons for narcotics and firearms offenses, and made 398 narcotics purchases, of which 337 were in an undercover capacity. GIU also seized \$645,294 cash, along with seven vehicles valued at \$134,100 and illegal drugs worth an estimated \$502,619. The GIU closed 940 cases by arrest and assisted 404 outside police agencies.

Program: Narcotics Enforcement

### Mandate:

The State Police fills a critical void for many rural, suburban and small city police departments, which typically lack the personnel or resources to maintain their own trained undercover narcotics units.

Mandated Funding Level:

Brief Description/History/Background:

The Division currently has more than 200 sworn members dedicated to narcotics enforcement duties statewide. These include members assigned to the five regional Community Narcotics Enforcement Teams (CNET), Troop Narcotics Enforcement Units (NEU) in Troops B and L, five Drug Enforcement Task Forces (DETF) and specialized details throughout the state. Their efforts annually result in the identification of money-laundering operations at home and abroad, confiscation of thousands of pounds of illegal drugs, numerous arrests and the seizure of millions of dollars of drug-tainted property and cash.

Members assigned to CNET are a key component of the package of resources available to Operation IMPACT jurisdictions.

The Gaming Detail, established in July 1993, provides round the clock law enforcement and public safety services at four Native American-owned and operated gambling casinos around the state. These include: Turning Stone Casino, operated by the Oneida Indian Nation, In Verona, Oneida County, the Akwesasne Mohawk Casino, operated by the St. Regis Mohawk Tribe, in Franklin and St. Lawrence countles, and the Seneca Niagara and Seneca Allegany casinos, operated by the Seneca Nation of Indians, In Niagara Falls and Salamanca, Niagara and Cattaraugus countles, respectively. The Seneca Nation presently is constructing a third casino, in the city of Buffalo, Erle County pursuant to Gaming Compacts between each tribe and the State.

The Fleet Management Section is responsible for the acquisition, deployment, maintenance and surplus of all Division vehicles.

### Mandated Funding Level:

None.

Brief Description/History/Background:

In addition to our Ford Crown Victoria and Chevrolet Tahoe patrol vehicles, the Fleet Management Section acquires a variety of mid-sized vehicles for use by BCI members and specialty vehicles, including vans, trucks, and four-wheel-drive utility vehicles; all purchased through a competitive bidding process. Maintenance of this fleet is done by NYSP repair staff at the nine regionally based troop headquarters and at Building #18 of the State Office Building Campus in Albany, augmented where necessary by commercial repair businesses. The Division also maintains auto body shops. When no longer serviceable, Division vehicles are stripped of all emergency equipment and sold at public auction by the State Office of General Services, Surplus Property Unit.

### Issues:

Fuel costs are a major concern as current estimates are for total miles driven to exceed 80 million miles. Staff is working with the vehicle manufacturers to insure that safe and efficient vehicles are available for patrol activities. Vehicle acquisition plans include procurement of more fuel efficent vehicles for use by BCI members.

Program: Information Services

#### Mandate

The mission of information Services (IS) is to develop, provide and support information technology solutions that are reliable land secure, and which facilitate the operations of the New York State Police.

### Mandated Funding Level:

None

Brief Description/History/Background:

IS's role is to facilitate the operations of the New York State Police by developing information technology solutions, including the New York Statewide Police Information Network (NYSPIN), which serves law enforcement and criminal justice users throughout the State, Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS), a partnership between state and local agencies to replace the old paper-driven system manual process with a front-end automated data collection computer application resulting in more timely and accurate data to the courts, DMV and DoT, the implementation of a records management system — Spectrum Justice System (SJS) and expanded Geographic information System (GIS) capabilities to include data acquisition and map creation, including specialized products such as a portable GIS system capable of deployment statewide on short notice special details or natural disasters. This mapping will allow for the expansion of the NYSP's Automated Vehicle Locator (AVL) program, which will enhance officer safety and form the basis for the NYSP's Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system, which will improve resource allocation across the State.

#### issues:

Major system upgrades to NYSPIN are on-going. The roll-out of TraCS to local agencies is on-going. Both of these projects will improve the operations of law enforcement agencies and criminal justice agencies state-wide. TraCS will also provide much needed data to DMV, DoT and the courts system in a more timely manner. Internal system improvements including SJS, GiS, AVL and CAD will improve State Police operations and enhance officer safety.

In addition to providing engineering, system design, procurement and installation oversight for the Division's array of communications systems – many of which must be integrated with those of other state, county and local agencies – section staff also are tasked with providing 'round-the-clock, two-way communication capability at emergency command posts, technical assistance for other NYSP initiatives and communication services for special events. Communications oversees the agency's statewide radio network and supporting infrastructure, which consists of 110 radio towers and 42 radio control points, as well as the acquisition and distribution of mobile and portable radios throughout the state. It is also responsible for the "24/7" management of the Division's voice telecommunications networks, serving hundreds of State Police facilities and special operations statewide.
Issues:
Lack of progress on the Statewide Wireless Network is a major concer as the Communications section attempts to maintain the existing radio system. In addition to capacity and coverage issues with the existing system, FCC mandated rebanding must be done with-in the next five years. Division Communications Radio System includes: 110 transmitter sites, 36 dispatch/radio control points, 4,600 mobile radios and 3,100 portable radios.

Brief Description/History/Background:

Since 1936, the NYSP Crime Laboratory System has made providing quality forensic science services to the entire state criminal justice system its fundamental mission. The system incorporates four facilities, the Forensic Investigation Center (FIC) in Albany, the Mid-Hudson Regional Lab, established in 1978 at Stewart Airport in Newburgh (Orange County), the Southern Tier Regional Lab in Port Crane (Broome County), established in 1979, and the Western Regional Lab in Olean (Cattaraugus County), established in 1987.

#### Issues

Long-term the viability of the existing regional labs needs to be examined. With increased scrutiny by the accrediting agencies, consideration needs to be given to replacing these facilities, upgrading these facilities, combining these facilities with other regionally based State facilities or consolidating all forensic activities in Albany.

Employee Relations is responsible for the testing, hiring and training of new employees and administers the collective bargaining agreements between the State all employees represented by its various employee organizations, as well as in grievance hearings and improper practice proceedings before the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB).

Brief Description/History/Background:

Employee Relations oversees the Human Resources, Employee Benefits and Employee Staffing sections, the State Police Academy and the Employee Assistance Program. It also administers the collective bargaining agreements between the State of New York and all employees represented by the Police Benevolent Association of the New York State Troopers (PBA), the New York State Police Investigators Association (NYSPIA), the Civil Service Employees Association (CSEA), the Public Employees Federation (PEF), and the New York State Correctional Officers and Police Benevolent Association (NYSCOPBA). It represents the Division in contract negotiations and interest arbitration proceedings between the state and the various employee organizations, as well as in grievance hearings and improper practice proceedings before the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB). It is also responsible for recruitment, testing and training of all sworn and nonsworn employees of the Division.

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PBA collective bargaining agreement for the Troopers' and Supervisors' units expired March 31, 2007. NYSPIA collective bargaining agreement for investigators and senior investigators expired March 31, 2007.

The 196th Session of the Basic School completed the tenth week of its six-month program, with 96 Recruits attending as of June 30. Cyclical in-service training for sworn personnel was administered in a decentralized program in the field and combined with the firearms qualification schedule. Standard centralized training also was conducted at the Academy, with courses for newly appointed supervisors, training for new investigators and specialized instruction in numerous other areas. A total of 15,993 persons received in-service training at the Academy in 2007. The recruitment campaign for the 2008 NYSP Entrance Examination began June 4, 2007. Recruitment efforts resulted in 27,963 candidates applying to take the exam in January and February 2008 throughout the state. In 2007, statewide examinations were was conducted for the positions of Secretary 1 (SG-1) and SP Communications Specialist. The Civilian Hiring Unit is working with the Local Exams Section at the Department of Civil Service to schedule promotional examination opportunities for the positions of Keyboard Specialist 2 (SG-9), Calculations Clerk 2 (SG-9) and Clerk 2 (SG-9).

They teach courses to recruits, current members and employees, as well as to outside personnel at the State Police Academy and various locations across the state and participate as instructors for the New York Prosecutors Training Institute. They review changes in state and federal law and makes recommendations for related changes in Division operations and prepare legal service bulletins to help keep police officers and prosecutors aware of changes in the law. They also work with field personnel to assist in decisions concerning asset forfeiture and Freedom of Information Law requests and draft and review leases and contracts, and prepare, review legislative proposals and coordinate responses to subpoenas for personnel and records. Finally, the office oversees the prosecution of employee misconduct matters.
