CAPITAL PROJECTS BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for capi-2 tal projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), 3 4 5 purposes, and projects designated by the appropriations, and authorized to be made available as hereinafter provided to the respective public 6 7 officers; such appropriations shall be deemed to provide all costs necessary and pertinent to accomplish the intent of the appropriations 8 9 and are appropriated in accordance with the provisions of section 93 of 10 the state finance law.

11 b) Any amounts specified in this chapter for advances for capital 12 projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the 13 purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), 14 15 purposes and projects designated by the appropriations as advances from 16 the capital projects fund in accordance with the provisions of sections 17 40-a and 93 of the state finance law, and are authorized to be paid as 18 hereinafter provided as an advance for a share, part or whole of the 19 cost for such programs, purposes and projects hereinafter specified.

20 c) The several amounts specified in this chapter as capital projects -21 reappropriations, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accom-22 plish the purpose of the appropriations, as appropriated by comprehen-23 sive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation 24 CCP), purposes, and projects, being the undisbursed and/or unexpended 25 balances of the prior year's appropriations, are reappropriated and 26 unless otherwise amended or repealed in part or total in this chapter 27 shall continue to be available for the same purposes as the prior appro-28 priations or as otherwise amended for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 29 2024.

The capital projects reappropriations contained in this chapter may be amended by repealing the items set forth in brackets and by adding thereto the underscored material. Certain reappropriations in this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and underscores 1 for additions, the purpose, amounts, funding source and all other 2 aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last appro-3 priated.

For the purpose of complying with section 25 of the state finance law, the year, chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chapter 54, section 1, of the laws of 2023.

d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

e) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2024 except as otherwise noted.

Such focus areas may 42 include, but are not limited to childhood poverty and homelessness. 43 Activities included in such plan may include, but are not limited 44 to: providing public assistance recipients opportunities to participate in enhanced work activities that either provide recognized 45 46 credentialing or enhanced career readiness or job training for 47 better linkage to potential employment; assisting families in pover-48 ty through services provided to parents and children; and addressing 49 chronic homelessness or housing insecurity. Such plan must include 50 measurable objectives and a timeframe for completion and shall be 51 submitted for approval to the commissioner of the office of tempo-52 rary and disability assistance. Of the total amount made available 53 to each anti-poverty task force, the lesser of \$300,000 or 20 54 percent of the total award may be used to carry out planning and 55 administration, provided however, that the amount used for planning 56 and administration may exceed such limitation if such amount is 57 approved by the commissioner of the office of temporary and disabil-58 ity assistance as part of the plan required herein.
